City of LaGrange to Shut Down for Second Year and Hundreds of Employees Will Pick Up Litter Throughout Community, Public & Businesses Invited to Participate

LaGrange, Ga. April 3, 2019 – The City of LaGrange plans to shut down business for a second year on Friday, April 26th from 8:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m. and all non-essential employees will go out into the community’s main thoroughfares to pick up litter.

LaGrange Mayor Jim Thornton, Troup County Commission Chairman Patrick Crews, West Point Mayor Steve Tramell, Hogansville Mayor Bill Stankiewicz, along with Keep Troup Beautiful began discussions in early 2018 about addressing litter in the community and decided to focus on education efforts in the community.
